Description:

Applications and methods of linear algebra emphasizing vectors, matrices, systems of equations, determinants, eigenvectors and eigenvalues. This course is an excellent introduction to linear algebra for students who are interested in a math minor. It does not satisfy requirements for the math major.

Prerequisites:

MATH 250B, 254 or 355. Must not have taken MATH 313.

Homework:

There will be weekly or biweekly homework (depending on the hardness of the material).

Quizzes:

There will be 6 unannounced pop-quizzes. The one with the lowest score will be dropped.

Exams:

There will be 3 midterms and one final exam Midterm 1: January 30, 2019

Midterm 2: February 27, 2019 Midterm 3: April 3, 2019

Final Exam: 8:00am-10:00am May 8, 2019

Grading Policy:

Homework (15%) and quizzes (10%), 3 Midterms (total 45%), Final exam (30%). The final grade will be based on this score.
